Providence Designated Healthy Utah Community



Providence City was recently named a Healthy Utah Community, receiving the designation from Get Healthy Utah in partnership with the Utah League of Cities and Towns.

The campaign toward the designation was spearheaded by Jeanell Sealy, a member of the Providence City Council. With assistance from Mayor Kathleen Alder, a coalition was formed to complete the application and requirements set by Get Healthy Utah.

Requirements included a community health plan and the implementation of health strategies throughout the community. Among Providence's focuses were: sidewalks with adequate lighting, safe disposal of medications, safe routes to schools and healthy snacks for city employees.

By being named a Healthy Utah Community, the city will now potentially qualify for additional grants and planning money that can expand the healthy lifestyle goals we have. With an increased focus on physical activity, mental health and access to healthy food, Providence City will work to continually connect residents to local resources.

Providence was one of six Utah cities to be selected this year, joining Harrisville, Lindon, Price, Riverdale and Santaquin. Overall, 39 cities have been designated Healthy Utah Communities. Providence is the third Cache Valley city to be recognized, joining Logan and North Logan who earned the designation in 2020 and 2021, respectively.

Trim the Trees

Now that the snow is finally gone, the trees are leafing out and vegetation is growing. This is a great time to trim back vegetation and tree branches that are starting to impede pedestrian and vehicle travel on the sidewalks and streets adjacent to your property.

The bottom of a tree canopy should be trimmed to a minimum of eight feet above a sidewalk and a minimum of 14 feet above a roadway. If you feel a park strip tree should be removed, except in the case of emergency, please contact Public Works at (435) 753-0313 to get a permit to remove the tree.

Thank you to everyone who is supporting the skatepark project at Zollinger Park. Because of your outpouring of support at the Cache County council meeting, the project was awarded an additional \$50,000 in RAPZ grant funding, giving the city a total of \$250,000 toward the skatepark. We are working on getting the park designed now, and are excited to move forward!

Yes, Water is Coming

While other Cache Valley cities are starting to see effects of snowpack melting, flooding has not started in Providence yet—but it will.

Providence Canyon is deeper and at a higher elevation than other Cache Valley areas, so it takes more time for the water to reach Spring Creek. Water levels are continuing to rise and we anticipate flooding to begin the first two weeks of June.

Residents can track water levels <u>online</u>. This website is updated twice daily.

Please continue to help us prepare by keeping debris away from your storm drains. This includes leaves, gravel, grass clippings, etc. It is also helpful to remove debris you may see in Spring Creek.

A Word from Public Works

We often receive phone calls about paint and/or flags posted throughout the city. These markings are showing the location of underground utilities. Whenever excavation is going to be taking place, utility lines are marked. Blue Stakes of Utah generates tickets for each project which are sent to all participating utilities. Each color of paint or flag that you see, corresponds with a specific utility.

Blue — Water
Green — Sanitary Sewer
Purple — Storm Water
Red — Electric Power Lines, Cables,
Conduit and Lightning Cables

Yellow — Gas, Oil, Steam, Petroleum or Gaseous Materials Orange — Communication White — Proposed Excavation Pink — Temporary Survey Marking

If you are doing any type of excavation on your property, call 811 or $\underline{\text{go online}}$ to start the Blue Stakes process.
