Message from the Mayor

Planning Commission studied four subjects on their 13 May meeting: Amendments for the zoning element of the Providence City general plan including the zoning districts for future annexation and future rezone of existing districts; amendments to Code 10-8-5 concerning commercial zoned districts, site development and parking regulations; amend-



ments to code 10-8-3 allowing uncovered decks to extend into the rear setback; and code 10-5 regarding hazard slope zones, engineering geotechnical report and disclosures of other natural hazards. At their 27 May meeting Planning held three public hearings: A proposed rezone of 1.198 acres of property from Agriculture to Single Family Traditional located at approximately 240 South, 325 West; code amendments concerning overlay zones regarding hazard slope zones, engineering geotechnical report and disclosures of other natural hazards; and allowing uncovered decks to extend into the rear setback. All three resulted in positive recommendations to be considered by Council. Planning also approved an amended final plat for Eagleview Estates Phase 2 amending the boundary line which will now proceed for engineering signature. Planning also discussed possible amendments for the zoning element of the general plan, including the zoning districts for future annexation and future rezone of existing districts.

Due to the holiday, Council only met once; 12 May. Council held a public hearing on adjustments to the FY 2015 budget relative to the proposal to purchase a new office building on Gateway Drive. The adjustment was to use funds collected in prior years (approximately 1.1 million) for the purchase. There was a good turn out of citizens and a vast majority were in favor of the purchase. The budget adjustment allowed the city to use reserves (collected over many years) and will not necessitate a property tax increase. The majority of Council voted in favor of the resolution and we are proceeding with the purchase. In addition the Council approved a resolution in favor of a contract between Cache County and Providence City for law enforcement services and animal control for another year. The Council also approved a resolution to "consider" an annexation of approximately 33.31 acres at approximately 500 North 400 East for future development. The developer has been cooperative with city staff on infrastructure requirements.

I urge citizens to become involved in understanding city government and express their views. One significant way of doing that is to run for office. The first week of June is when prospective candidates for City Council may register for the upcoming election. Please stop in and visit with me when you come in to register. I always welcome company. Public Works News:

For customers with underground sprinkling systems. Current state plumbing code requires a backflow preventer on all underground sprinkling systems.

The backflow preventer is a device that prevents impurities or contaminants from being drawn into the drinking water system. Many sprinkling systems already have the proper backflow preventer installed and need only be tested annually. Others may not meet state and local regulations and may need to be replaced with the proper backflow preventer.

The regulations also require a state certified backflow technician test the backflow preventer annually. For a list of local technicians, please contact the Public Works department at 435-753-0313.

Storm Water-Did You Know . .

Garden Care

- Plant a rain garden of native plants, shrubs and trees that reduce the amount of fertilizer needed and provide a way for water to soak into the ground.
- Install a rain barrel to collect rainwater; the rainwater can later be used to wash your car or water your plants
- Adopt techniques that utilize natural processes to manage storm water runoff and reduce the impact of impervious surfaces on water quality.
- Use pervious pavers for walkways and low traffic areas to allow water to soak into the ground.
- Incorporate best management practices, such as grassed swales, filter strips, or buffer strips on your property to control and temporarily store storm water runoff.
- Use yard waste, which includes grass clippings and leaves, in mulch or compost for your garden.

Providence City Council Notice of Public Hearings

The Providence City Council will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, June 9, 2015 at 6:15 p.m. to receive public comment on the proposed Providence City 2016 Budgets for all Funds (General, Capital Project, Water, Sewer, and Storm Water.

Please keep sidewalks free from obstructions.

Did you know is it a violation of Providence City Code to place items on the sidewalk that obstruct use of the sidewalk? Boards, dams, tree limbs, etc. placed on the sidewalks are considered obstructions and should be removed. Please avoid parking vehicles, trailers, etc. on the sidewalks. In some neighborhoods, the sidewalk is adjacent to a rolled curb. When parking in these neighborhoods, please park in a manner that does not impede sidewalk use.
