





Planning held two meetings in September. On 14 September there were two action items. They considered for approval, and approved, a lot consolidation combining lots 6 and 7 of the Grand View Hills Subdivision, located generally at 893 Foothill Drive requested by Robert James. Since Robert James is a member of the Planning Commission he excused himself from voting. They also considered, and approved, a preliminary plat for Sutherland Subdivision (a partial amendment of Everton Minor Subdivision, Subdividing Lot 1, a 4 lot residential subdivision located at approximately 810 South 400 East. There was a rezone request to change the zone for a 77.5 acre parcel located in the northeast corner of the City at approximately 500 North 600 East, from Agricultural to Single Family Traditional which will then go for a public hearing before a decision is made. In addition, there was a discussion on proposed code amendments to Providence City Code Title 10 Zoning Regulations Chapter 1 General Provisions Section 4 Definitions by adding a definition for an "Accessory Building (Small)" which was also determined to go to a public hearing. The Commission then discussed sections and/or elements of the General Plan and other items of concern, with the intent of establishing priorities and assigning a commission member as a facilitator for each item.

On 28 September the Planning Commission held two public hearings (above). After both public hearings they recommended approval to the Council for a more specific definition for accessory buildings (small) as well as a recommendation for approval the rezone for the 77.5 acre parcel. Concerning the accessory building, there is a need to change and better define a small accessory building due to the many small accessory buildings that have been built over the years. The prior ordinance was established around 1991 and needed revised to better balance the needs of the home owners. and the city. Discussion continued on work on the General Plan. The Commission also approved a preliminary plat for the Providence Heights Subdivision, a 30-lot residential subdivision located at approximately 900 South 400 East (the Baker property).

Council also held two meetings in September. On 7 September the Council met and approved a resolution awarding the bid for the Pickleball Courts at Alma H. Leonhardt Park and also approved a resolution awarding the bid for the Zollinger Park Lighting Project.

On 13 September the Council had a full agenda. They held a public hearing making adjustments to the 2017 Budgets for General Fund and Capital Project Fund to improve additional area in the Cemetery by increasing the General Fund Prior Year Funds revenue to \$50,000 moving money received in prior years for Perpetual Care. This will allow us to increase the available burial places within our Cemetery. After the public hearing, Council approved this resolution. The Utah Local Government Trust (our insurance representative) presented the city with a cash rebate (along with a plaque) for our due diligence for the past year. The Council then passed a resolution amending the Providence Moderate Income Housing element of the General Plan with the intent of amending the plan to reflect the current and future needs of the city. This determines that cities facilitate a reasonable opportunity for a variety of housing, including moderate income housing to meet the needs of people desiring to live here and fully participate in all aspects of neighborhood and community life. The Council then approved a code amendment concerning Off-Highway Vehicles including but not limited to the following: amending the definition of adult supervision, amending supervision for operators under the age of 16 and this was approved without prohibiting snowmobiles on Providence roads; snowmobiles are still allowed on our roads. The specific nuisance concern will be addressed under the provisions in our nuisance ordinance.

Two discussion items were also on the agenda. The over abundance of deer in our city will be forthcoming with Councilman Giles receiving the assignment of putting together data on their possible removal. In addition, a citizen has expressed concern over our present design standards for the width of roads in new subdivisions and this was referred to Planning for study and recommendation.

Please be patient with the construction and road improvements we are making (as well as Millville). I hope you can see the progress that has been made and the benefits for all our citizens. Drive defensively and safely.

I look forward to seeing you at Oktoberkraut on October 8. Mayor Calderwood



With fall just around the corner, the Public Works Department would like to remind you that we will be picking up leaf bags. **We would ask that you do not rake your leaves or place your leaf bags in the gutter** and that the bags be placed on the curb or edge of your property.



We will not be picking up or chipping branches. The green waste bins are still available at the Public Works Facility at 350 East Center. If you choose to take your leaf bags to the green waste bins, please do not place the bags in the bins, you will need to open them and empty your leaves into the bins.

A Message From The Logan City Environmental Department

The Logan City Environmental Department has been performing studies to help us better understand recycling contamination in hopes of better combating the problem. Our current recycling contamination rate is 18% and we would like to see lower contamination rates - around 10-12%. This past summer, employees looked in cans to identify contaminants. Approximately 33% of the cans we looked in had zero contamination! However, in cans that had contamination present, nearly 87% of the contamination is one of these 7 items: Plastic Bags, Food Wrappers, Tissue, Styrofoam, Plastic without the Recycling Symbol, Pizza Boxes, or Disposable Dishware. We ask that Cache County residents do not place these items in their blue curbside recycling container.
