The Health Crisis and More

As I'm sure you know, these are challenging times for all of us. There is no one who has not been affected in some way; young, old, parents, students, employees, employers, government entities.

All schools, public, private, elementary, middle, high schools, universities, technical schools have altered their schedules and their instructional methodologies.

All employers are impacted whether they do business with the public or not. Employees are expected to change their work habits; that is if they still have a job.

According to the Utah Taxpayers Association, as of Friday, March 26, weekly initial unemployment benefit claims reached the highest level in the history of our country. Claims were five times higher than the worst week during the Great Recession of 2008 at almost 2.9 million claims.

The stock market has dropped about 25 percent in just over a month in reaction to the impact on the economy. As most of the stock market is invested in retirement funds, almost every working American is impacted. The market is indicator of investor sentiment and faith in the future of the economy.

The Great Depression

An economic crisis almost a century ago resulted in a depression that impacted our country severely. Our parents and grandparents can tell you how they survived. Are we in danger of experiencing the same, or is there light at the end of the tunnel? It depends on which crisis you are talking about.

There are encouraging signs that the Coronavirus is peaking with the number of cases and fatalities in many countries flattening or headed down. A report from Italy that has suffered some of the worse says that over 99% of Coronavirus related fatalities had at least one other serious illness that was life-threatening by itself; its called "comorbidity." That message is clear that a healthy immune system is key to fighting the disease.

But the political crisis is another story. It seems to be more intense every day. The closures and lockdowns continue to be more widespread. Unemployed and locked down people will have their patience worn thin.

By what measures will we determine that the crisis is over; who decides? What will our country look like after this? We will be able to shake hands again? Give someone a hug? Only see our grandkids on video?

What happens when next year's virus appears?

Green Waste

The green waste bins are now at the Public Works Facility (350 East Center) and available for use. As per Logan City, the dumpsters will only be available from April 6th through May 1st and will then return again for one month in the fall.

Logan City does offer a green waste curb side pickup. The charge is \$5.00/month and the can is picked up every Wednesday. The season begins the end of March and runs through mid-November. If you are interested in this service, please contact Logan City at 435.716.7955.

We have requested from Logan City one garbage dumpster for spring cleanup. Watch for the dumpster around the 17th of April and it will be here for 2 weeks. Please do not place garbage on the ground if the dumpster is full and **tires are not allowed.**

There will also be a dumpster at the Public Works Facility for metal items.

Just as a reminder, the City will no longer be picking up branches, please use the green waste bins at the Public Works Facility.

It's Spring Cleaning Time!

Don't rake or sweep debris into your gutter or storm drain. Check your gutter and sweep up any debris that might be in it. If you have a storm drain by you, and it has leaves or other debris covering it, try to clean it out as best as you can. Instead of spraying your driveway with water to get it clean, try to sweep it and throw away what you sweep up.

Storm water does not get treated like all of our other water does. We need to do our part to help keep it as clean as possible.

Urgent notice from Logan City Sewer Department

Wastewater from Providence City is carried through a gravity-fed sewer system, and flows under Highway 165 to pipelines in Logan. From there, to the treatment plant east of Logan City. The following is an urgent message from Logan sewer department.

Please stop flushing garbage down the toilet. We are seeing it firsthand. The only paper product that should be flushed is toilet paper. Any paper product, other than toilet paper, even those marked 'flushable,' 'biodegradable,' or 'compostable,' do not dissolve like toilet paper in water. Any kind of wipes, rags, paper towels, diapers, etc. can cause damage that requires costly repairs to laterals at the homeowner's expense, and costly repairs to sewer mains and sewer pumping stations at the taxpayers' expense.

Whether it be your street that backs up sewer into your basements, or simply the fact that your tax dollars go to avoidable sewer repairs, we are all in this together. Be a good neighbor and citizen and make sure the only paper your toilet sees is toilet paper.

Urgent Message from the American Red Cross

Listen and follow the directions of your **STATE AND LOCAL AUTHORITIES**

DO NOT VISIT nursing homes or retirement or long-term care facilities unless to provide critical assistance.

ALWAYS PRACTICE GOOD HYGENE:

- *Wash your hands, especially after touching any frequently used item or surface.*
- *Avoid touching your face.*
- *Sneeze or cough into a tissue, or the inside of your elbow.*
- *Disinfect frequently used items and surfaces as much as possible.*
