- <u>Item No. 2 CAPSA's Services:</u> Bryce Lancaster, CAPSA Services Awareness Educator, will review CAPSA's services through the course of the pandemic specifically in reference to our services supporting survivors of sexual assault.
  - B Lancaster said that we are seeing some stabilization in [domestic violence numbers] but an
    increase in rape and sexual assault numbers. B Lancaster reviewed CAPSA services related to
    victims of sexual assault. They have caseworkers and therapists that can help survivors and
    secondary survivors in many ways.

• <u>Item No 4 Water Master Plan Grant Application:</u> Grant application for Providence City's Water Master Plan through the Permanent Community Impact Board.

o R Snow explained that the Community Impact Board is a state entity that is set up for planning and impact mitigation. We are asking for \$45,000 towards a \$90,000 [Water Master Plan]. It will include a hydraulic model. It will include identifying the capital improvement needs in our culinary system. We are not looking for any loan for this plan. If they do not fund it, we will try to fund it all out of our budget. It may delay it a little bit. We have looked at other options. There are specific pieces of our water system that need this plan. There is also a subdivision that would like to expand in a low pressure area, and the master plan should identify any needs or changes that need to be made. The plan will foresee our construction for the next 20 years. We are interested to hear any public comment or questions on this proposal.

- R Snow explained that we have worked with Visionary Homes to resolve the issue regarding the design standards for their other developments. [This approval (Providence Gateway Phase N) was held up at the previous meeting due to a failure to meet the standards in the other developments].
- Dallas Nicholl of Visionary Homes explained their efforts to meet the façade requirements for Vineyard and Providence Gateway.
- S Bankhead explained that in the future, we will require the developer to resubmit elevations so that we can ensure that they are the same as the elevations submitted with the original application.

- ➤ Item No. 8: Resolution 030-2021 Dew Tank Construction Noise Variance Permit (Exhibit): The Providence City Council will consider and may take action on a resolution granting a noise variance permit. J-U-B and Spindler Corporation who will be doing construction for the Dew Tank would like to start working as early as 4:00 in the morning on the days that they will be pouring concrete. Requesting a noise variance permit for the entirety of the summer. Expected affected areas include Sherwood Ave, Abby Ln (South End) and Maple Hollow Ln.
  - o Darek Kimball of JUB Engineers, the Council, and R Stapley discussed the request. Late night hours are necessary due to the type of construction we are using.
  - R Stapley suggested allowing them to have a certain number of days for the variance instead of giving them a blank check for all summer.
  - O J Paulsen felt that we should give them a certain number of days and that residents should be notified. C Kirk felt that the notification should include an explanation of why it is necessary. B Speth wanted this included in the newsletter and felt that we should put up signs to notify residents of the days for pouring. J Paulsen felt that the contractors should have permission for up to five pours and that residents should receive 48 hours' notice. The contractors and the city should communicate with residents to explain the situation and apologize for the [first pour].
  - Darrell Hansen of Spindler Construction discussed the different options for organizing the pours and how much time they would need.

Motion to amend the resolution 030-2021 to allow a noise variance for up to two all-nighters and up to three as early as 4 am., with some additional caveats that the residents are given at least 48 hours notice of the pour by flyer to the door along Center Street from 300 East [upward] and on Sherwood drive from Eagleview Drive to Abbey Lane, and additionally two sandwich boards (working with the city) put out 48 hours before at Center Street and 300 East (1) and at 400 East and Center (1), and that a letter be drafted to the residents (listed above) prior to any additional pours, in cooperation with the city and reviewed by the city manager, that states the intent and what is going on and explains the messaging and the necessity for the variance:—

  - Scott Archibald of Sunrise Engineering explained the progress on the plan. Sewer infiltration was discussed.
  - o B Speth spoke about infiltration issues near Lex Baer's shop. He asked R Stapley to look at it.
  - Mayor Drew spoke about infiltration. He has been tracking the difference between the cities that contract with Logan. We consistently have more sewer flow than Smithfield and Nibley and we could save a large amount of money if we fixed it. He will be convening a meeting with Logan City Environmental Department and other cities and engineers to discuss sump pumps/infiltration.
  - S Archibald discussed the differences between Providence's system and Smithfield and Nibley's.
  - o The Council discussed the options for replacing the line that connects Providence to Logan.
